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ABOUT THE SUMMER SCHOOL

The Summer School of "The Qur'an and the Bible: Comparative Studies" is a short-term training course for graduate students to learn how to conduct comparative studies between the Qur'an and the Bible. This training course is organized in collaboration with Inekas Community, Shahid Beheshti University, and Iranian Quran Miracle Association (IQMA).

The aim of this course is to teach the most important approaches, methods, principles, tools, and languages a researcher needs for study of the scriptures of the Abrahamic religions in a comparative manner. In this course, students get familiar with the problems and questions in related areas and learn how to use the available tools to conduct their desired research.

This course is designed for 40 hours and experts in the field of Bible studies will deliver the lectures. 10 hours are devoted to workshops in which attendees focus on common issues when researching about the Qur'ān and the Bible. This session is held before the professors.

Since the target audiences of the course are young Iranian students and researchers, it is intended to deliver most of the course in Persian.



Keynote Speaker

Mohammad Masjed Jame'i

University of Religions and Denominations, Iran

MOHAMMAD MASJED JAME'I was born in a well-known religious and traditional family in Tehran, Iran. He studied Medical Basic Science, and then Islamic Philosophy in Tehran University. Since 1983, he has been studying and teaching Islamic Theology and Jurisprudence in the Theological Seminary of Qom, Iran. He gained his Ph.D. in Geopolitics from the Pisa University, Italy.

From 1991 to 1997, he was the ambassador of Iran to the Vatican. From 1997 to 2002, he served as the General Director for Cultural Affairs in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. From 2002 to 2005, he was the ambassador of Iran to Morocco.

Since 2005, he has been the Chief Advisor and a Member of the Academic Board of the University of Religions and Denominations, Qom. At the same time, he has been a lecturer in Middle



East Studies in the School of International Studies of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Currently, he is the Director of the Institute for Strategic Studies of Contemporary Islam (Maram Institute).

He has authored many scholarly articles and a number of books on Persian Gulf and Middle East Studies, Geopolitics of Iran, Geopolitics of the Middle East Region, Geopolitics of Today's Christianity, Interreligious Dialogue, and the Arab World Affairs.

GHASEM DARZI, Qur'ān researcher, faculty member of Shahid Beheshti University, Vice Chancellor for Research and Postgraduate Studies, Institute of Interdisciplinary Studies of the Qur'ān and cofounder of Tehran Interdisciplinary Circle, which has focused on interdisciplinary studies for more than a decade. He currently conducts his studies on theoretical and methodological issues arose in this field.

The translation of "Oxford Interdisciplinary Handbook" as well as the authorship of the book "Methodology of Interdisciplinary Qur'ānic Studies" are among his most recent works.

Gender studies is another his field of interest as he has presented articles and delivered lectures in this regard in prestigious



international journals and conferences. The University of Munster, Germany, hosted him last year for a lecture on this subject.

MOHAMMAD HAGHANI FAZL is a postdoctoral fellow at the Centre of Islamic Theology at the University of Paderborn, Germany. He studied Islamic theology, Tafsīr (Qur'ānic exegesis) and also Abrahamic Religions in Iran. In 2019, he finished his Ph.D. in Comparative Study of Religions. His dissertation was concerned with the impact of interreligious dialogue on the interpretation of scriptures.

His main research area is Qur'ānic studies, Biblical studies, and the exegesis of the scriptures. He has, for several years, been a research fellow at the University of Religions and Denominations, Iran. At present, he is a faculty member of Qur'ānic Studies and a member of the Prophetology Project at the University of Paderborn.

She hold a Ph.D. from Tarbiat Modarres University and a postdoctoral from Wissenschaftskolleg Zu Berlin.

Her publications include "Encounter of the Qur'ān towards Christianity," "Shi'a Exegesis in View of Western Scholars," "Mary's Worship in the Qur'ān," and "Reinterpretation of Sūra Qīyāma: Verses 16-19." In addition, She has a number of translations, e.g. "Qur'ān



and Women: What Is Faith" and "Essays in Philosophy of Religion: The Meaning of Life."




Abdulla Galadari

EHSAN ROOHI is an Independent scholar of Islamic origins and Arab-Byzantine relations.

SAMUEL ZINNER, Ph.D., contributed to German Scholars and Ethnic Cleansing 1920-1945 (Oxford/New York: Berghahn Books, 2004), which was awarded the American Library Association's prestigious Choice OUTSTANDING ACADEMIC BOOK OF THE YEAR AWARD for 2005. He has contributed articles to Religions/Adyan (Doha International Cen-TRE FOR INTERFAITH DIALOGUE), and other academic journals. He has served as a peerreview referee for journals such as Old Testament Essays, Paedagogia Christiana, etc. He regularly assists authors in revising their essays, leading to successful publication in journals such as Novum Testamentum, The Review of Metaphysics, The Heythorp Journal, International Philosophical Quarterly, The American Journal of Semiotics, etc. His research on Mandaeism has been referenced in the Journal of Semitic Studies and the Jour-



nal of the American Oriental Society. His books and essays on ancient and modern history and literature have been published internationally in a variety of languages (publishers include Oxford University Press, De Gruyter).

At the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Zinner concentrated in modern and ancient languages and literatures, history, and Museum Studies, with a further emphasis on archival studies. He has worked on projects funded by major grants from the NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES (NEH).

In 2005 and 2006, he collaborated with the Islamic Encyclopedia Foundation as a researcher, and since then he has collaborated with this foundation in compiling the entries of the Encyclopedia of the Islamic World and also in compiling the entries of the Great Islamic Encyclopedia with the Great Islamic Encyclopedia Centre.

He has been teaching and consulting in universities and higher education institutions



since 2011.





Also, he teaches religious epistemology, life after death, and Qur'ānic hermeneutics at various Iranian universities.


"Immortality," "Fideism," and "The Exegesis of Sharḥ-i Manzūma" (a philosophical textbook in Iran) are among his publications in Persian


Day 5 Ismail Albayrak
